PTC USHERS IN NEW ERA, NOW PTC

It is with great excitement that we introduce the rebranding of our beloved theatre company We are changing our name (just a little) from Pittsburg Community Theatre to the Pittsburg Theatre Company.

This change was brought about by our increasing awareness as a company that we are reaching an audience beyond our own community, in many ways, for the first time in our history. We have achieved a level of professionalism and quality in each of our productions, and our audiences have definitely taken note. The audience members and the performers who come to us now come from places we never would have anticipated, not only from all over the Bay Area, but in some cases from other states altogether.

Recently, we won the coveted Best Musical award at The Shellies for Joseph *and The Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat*, a feat that would have been almost unimaginable to pull off in PTC's early years. It is this renewed interest in excellence that has spurred us toward the decision to re-name our company.

Be assured, we are not abandoning the idea of community, and certainly not the community of Pittsburg, whose name we still proudly display in our new name and logo. We all feel rooted to this town and the legacy of the theatre company that was started as an Adult Education class, 40 some years ago, by our founder Betty Brown. I believe I am qualified to tell you that she would be thrilled about this next chapter in our growth.

DREAMGIRLS AND SUPREME GIRLS How Girl Groups Helped Change History

When *Dreamgirls* opened on Broadway in 1981, audiences were quick to draw parallels with the rise to fame of The Supremes. The creators of the show denied this was true, suggesting instead that the fictional girl group at the center of the show was a composite based on several bands like The Shirelles and The Marvelettes, and not meant to represent any singular group. It has been suggested that this was a reaction to a perceived threat of litigation by Diana Ross, who was not a fan of the show, or even the idea of the show.

The parallels are difficult to miss. As critic James Brewer has written: "Virtually every main character in *Dreamgirls* can be identified with a real-life counterpart. Deena Jones parallels Supremes lead singer Diana Ross, Curtis Taylor stands in for Berry Gordy, founder of Motown Records, and Effie White for Florence Ballard, the original lead singer of the Supremes, who was fired in 1967, at the height of the group's popularity. The character of James Early is not so clear-cut. He could be a cobbled together combination of Marvin Gaye and perhaps James Brown or even Junior Walker, for whom Gordy enjoyed early success as a songwriter."

Whoever the show is based on, the musical brings up a number of historic and culturally significant points about race relations and the pop music industry prevalent in 1960s and 1970s America. Again, according to Brewer: "A central issue in *Dreamgirls* is the existence of two music hit charts: the R&B, originally called "race music," chart, and the pop chart, which listed the mainstream hits sold to largely white audiences. The music industry felt it necessary to keep its eye on the recordings popular among black listeners, but the separate charts were clearly a product of the official racism endemic to a certain epoch."

Motown's rise occurred during a time of significant upheaval and change in America, including, of course, The civil rights movement, but its meteoric success was also inextricably bound with the city of Detroit. According to Brian McCollum of The Detroit Free Press: "It wasn't a fluke that Motown Records took flight in Detroit, part of a surge of creative energy that transformed the city into one of the world's music capitals. The industrial boom sparked decades earlier by Henry Ford had drawn more than a million migrants — many of them Black southerners lured by the chance of prosperity and a fresh start. The Great Migration, as it came to be called, didn't just fill northern cities with eager transplants. The new residents brought their customs with them, including the rich, musical traditions passed down through generations in the South." Or, as Martha Reeves of The Vandellas said more explicitly: "We all owe our debt to the car manufacturing developing here in Detroit."

Katy June-Friesen, writing in *The Smithsonian*, has suggested that girl groups like The Supremes and others are historically significant because of their gender, which allowed them to "crossover" into White American living rooms more easily than their male counterparts. More importantly: "the figure of the non-white teenage girl was being politicized in America. And the same non-threatening, pure quality that was letting black girl groups cross over into white culture was giving young women force in the civil rights movement."

Of course, their look and overall demeanor was still carefully cultivated. June Friesen notes that "the success of girl groups had to do with more than harmony and lyrics. It was about the whole performance—how they moved, the clothes they wore, how big their hair was. In Motown, Gordy hired finishing-school teacher Maxine Powell to teach the girls how to walk and talk. He also brought in professional choreographers. All of this was part of his effort—embraced by the girls—to convey a middle-class respectability."

The only girl group to go head-to-head with The Beatles (who were themselves obsessed with girl groups, covering their songs) was The Supremes. They were, arguably, the most important black recording act of all time (always a subjective call) and Motown's most successful act. Their cultural impact cannot be underestimated. As Mary Wilson said in her 1986 autobiography *Dreamgirls*: My Life as a Supreme: "Blacks and Whites were making efforts to change things, and our music helped to bridge the gap." The title of Wilson's biography indicates that the Broadway show had a least one Supreme fan.



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
