August Wilson was an American playwright often referred to as the "theatre's poet of Black America. *Fences* explores the evolving African-American experience and examines race relations, among other themes. The action takes place in the backyard of a house in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania and evolves around Troy Maxson. Troy is a family man, with a supportive wife, Rose. His son Cory is scared of him and often in disbelief of his father. Troy's story also includes his relationship with his disabled brother Gabriel, his best friend Bono; and a son, Lyons, from a previous relationship.

I have had the pleasure of working with a stellar cast remembering to push myself with all endeavors keeping up with the talent I am working with. 
#### LaTonya Watts, Director



#### THE BETTY BROWN STAGE

Tonight's performance is being performed on a stage that has been named for Betty Brown, PCT's founder and driving force for decades. Betty began her Pittsburg teaching career across the street at what was then Central Jr. High as a Speech and Drama teacher. Many years later, she

started an Adult Education course in Drama that met here in the Little Theatre. PCT continued performing at the high school after incorporating in 1979. This theatre was PCT's home for most of its forty-year history, before moving to the historic California Theatre in October 2013.

While the California is undergoing extensive and necessary renovations, PCT is on the road for the 2021-2022 season and potentially the 2022-2023 season. The choice to perform August Wilson's *Fences* on the stage named for our founder, in the building that was the company's home for so long, has been emotionally rewarding for our company in ways we can't begin to describe.

#### A TRIBUTE TO OUR OWN

PCT has been blessed with so many volunteers and sponsors throughout the years. Sadly, we have recently had to say goodbye to some treasured friends. In March 2020, we lost John "Jack" O'Leary. Jack was the kindest man you'd ever meet. He put the gentle in gentleman. He and his wife Honey were great performers and supporters of everything PCT. In October 2021, we lost the very special Judy O'Connor, to whom we dedicated this season. Then, in November 2021, Gary Cooper, husband of Marilyn Berg Cooper, passed away. Gary and Marilyn have been ardent supporters of PCT and our hearts go out to Marilyn and their family.

Finally, in December 2021, we learned of the passing of one of PCT's great actors and directors, Dean Creighton. On a personal note, I had the pleasure of working with Dean many times, but it is *The Odd Couple* I will never

forget. Recently, I watched the video of this performance and even through the limitations of an old video recording, I can see and feel the genuine affection between Felix and Oscar. This, of course, was not acting. Much love to his wife Anne, and his daughters Heather and Shawn; I am so lucky to have shared the stage with your husband and father. PCT is proud to dedicate this season to all our treasured friends.



#### AUGUST WILSON— A CENTURY OF BLACK VOICES

August Wilson was born in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania's economically depressed Hill District in 1945. The playwright's monumental cycle of ten plays, known as *The American Century Cycle*, all take place in this District (with the exception of *Ma Rainey's Black Bottom*). Each play takes place in a different decade of the last century, beginning with *Gem of the Ocean*, set at the turn of the century, through 1990's *Radio Golf*.

Wilson, who never intended to write a cycle of century-spanning plays, noticed he was doing so about three plays in: "'I've written three plays in three different decades, so why don't I just continue doing that?'" he said, referring to *Jitney* (set in 1971), *Fullerton Street* (set in 1941), and *Ma Rainey's Black Bottom* (set in 1927). Two plays from the cycle won the Pulitzer: *Fences* (set in the 1950s) and *The Piano Lesson* (set in the 1930s) and *Fences* also won the Tony award for Best Play of 1987. The play was also a successful film starring Denzel Washington and Viola Davis in a performance that won her the Oscar for Best Supporting Actress.

Wilson, and arguably *Fences* particularly, now occupies a place in the American theatre canon, regularly appearing on annual lists of most produced playwrights of the year. He has been called The American Shakespeare and is routinely taught in schools. Whether that is a good or bad thing may depend on how one feels about being made to read anything in school, but Wilson's artistry cannot be denied.

*Fences*, while ostensibly a naturalistic family drama, also manages to be richly symbolic: the fence in *Fences*, for instance, has numerous possible meanings. Wilson's style has often been described as poetic realism, a genre of the theatre embraced by Williams and O'Neill before him, in which the play appears to be a realistic depiction of everyday life, but in the characters' speech one hears a heightened sense of the poetic. In Wilson's case, that poetry is deeply rooted in black history and culture.

On its opening in 1987, New York Times critic Brent Staples noted that Wilson "brings us here a naked vernacular language intact, a language from the streets of his native Pittsburgh. There is laughter, the raucous call-and-response of the black church sermons, jazz and blues music all inevitably rooted in the African style. And as Troy holds court on his back step with his buddy, wife and children as audience and participants, we are back in Mr. Wilson's Pittsburgh, with men and women not even a full generation removed from tarpaper shacks, and just in from the very edge of the culture. Their style and language speak to that point."

**GWENDOLYN SAMPSON BROWN (ROSE)** is thrilled and humbled to play Rose Maxson in the Pulitzer Prize-winning play *Fences*. This is Gwen's second play with Pittsburg Community Theatre. The first was *A Raisin in the Sun* as Lena Younger. Gwen is no stranger to the stage. Gwen aspired to be an actress in high school and college, and then life happened, and her father convinced her to pursue nursing as a career instead. Still, her love for the performing arts never wavered. To date, one of her favorite performances

was the role of Libby in *Bee-Luther-Hatchee* and, of course, Lena Younger in *A Raisin in the Sun*. Gwen wants to thank PCT for trusting her with such a vital role in this powerful production.
