MEET THE DIRECTOR

Never having an issue of telling people what to do, his mother always said he should be a director. However, Terry had his sights set on Stardom on Broadway.

He studied Acting, Directing, Speech, and Music at San Francisco State University and the University of the Pacific. All this while performing throughout Northern California for various companies. In his younger years, he appropriated

directing techniques used by others and merged it into his own brand of Direction. It's a secret recipe. However, the goal is a heightened learning experience for all; the audience, cast, crew, and himself.

Terry is excited to make his directorial debut with Pittsburg Theatre Company. He last directed The Rocky Horror Show to sold out houses at the Pinole Playhouse. WORSHIPPING THE QUICKSAND SHE WALKS ON: FEMALE FRIENDSHIP AND FABULOUS HAIR IN STEEL MAGNOLIAS

In 1985, Louisiana native Robert Harling, an aspiring actor in New York City, lost his younger sister Susan to complications during minor surgery related to a nearly life-long struggle with diabetes. He decided to channel his grief into a tribute to her memory. That tribute became Steel Magnolias, a perfect oxymoron to describe the women who inhabit the play, as both their strengths and vulnerabilities get a workout in this much-loved show. Harling's inspiration for his all-female cast came from watching his mother interact with her friends, who often gathered at a local beauty parlor.

"I was really impressed, during the last five arduous years of my sister's life, how the women of the community all pulled together," Harling told The New York Times in 1987. "When I was a kid, the mystique of the beauty parlor was that guys were never allowed," he said in 2019. "You didn't know what went on in there, and they all came back different somehow. I realized this hermetically sealed environment would be the best place to have these women express their true feelings."

Harling based all the women in the show on his mother's real-life friends, including Ouiser: "I've never told a living soul who Ouiser is based on," he has said. "After the play had some success and everybody from Natchitoches (his hometown in Louisiana) went up to New York to see it, I was really worried because Ouiser's such a crotchety old curmudgeon. And lo and behold, every woman in town was saying, 'He based Ouiser on me."

The play was a hit, performed throughout the United States, and globally as well. An Australian performance proved to be the premiere theatrical performance by one Nicole Kidman (guess who she played?). The play has been made into a popular film with a star-studded cast, including Shirley MacLaine, Sally Field, Olympia Dukakis, Julia Roberts, and Dolly Parton.

Less well-known was the 1990 proposed television sitcom starring legendary Broadway diva Elaine Stritch as Ouiser. The show, also written by Harling, was to take place where the play leaves off, and a two-hour pilot series was filmed. It aired once and was not picked up for further development. In 2012, an African-American version of Steel Magnolias was filmed for Lifetime, with a cast including Queen Latifah, Phylicia Rashad, and Alfre Woodard.



Something about beauty parlors makes them a kind of monument to female self-empowerment and communion. According to Beth Daley of The Conversation: "Salon workers can develop a 'commercial friendship' with clients as they maintain close physical proximity with the client over a long period. But they are neutral figures in relation to emotional disclosures. This relationship means clients may disclose more details about the troubles in their lives than they would to friends or family."

And in "Social Roles of Hair Salons," author Kay Tang points out that "whereas only wealthy women could afford professional beauty services in the 19th century, women of all economic classes could have their hair styled in a salon of the 20th century. The hair-dressing industry took its cue from the role barbershops played in the cultivation of male culture and offered women a friendly place to commune with and seek support from other women."

The women of Steel Magnolias display this support, particularly as the play darkens near its closing. Harling clearly loves these extraordinary women. In a touching note to all who decide to perform the show, Harling has attached this proviso to the beginning of the printed version of his script:

"The women in this play are witty, intelligent, and above all, real characters. They in no way, shape, or form are meant to be portrayed as cartoons or caricatures."





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
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



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
