A Note from the Director

"Well, I like to think of myself as a bit of an archeologist. I have always been interested in what gets lost ... who gets left out of the picture."

After directing the staged reading of *The White Card* last year, I was elated when asked to direct it again and not only for Pinole Community Players but also for Pittsburg Theatre Company and OnStage Rep at The Campbell in Martinez. The previous PCP performances were followed by talk backs between the actors and the audience (as will

these). These talk backs were, in many ways, conversation starters that continued long after the audiences left the theatre. Yes!

On a side note, this time the casting proved to create a bit of a dilemma – one that most directors probably wish were the case. Everyone, yes, everyone who came in to audition for the various parts were beyond what I had hoped for, and well, I cast everyone! Yes, I've double cast roles before: *Inspector Calls, The Nerd*, etc., but this was truly a first. So, this production features four actors sharing two of the roles. It has been rewarding to see the different energies brought to the work by these women. It has been a true gift to work with all involved.

Finally, playwright Claudia Rankin believes that *The White Card* is a conversation starter regarding race and racism among strangers. This is my hope as well. Therefore ... Let the conversations begin!

About the director...

Carlene Coury is an award-winning Bay Area director, author, actress, and English professor who is pleased to be working with the Pittsburg Theatre Company and OnStage Repertory Theatre to bring *The White Card* to the stage. Ms. Coury's most recent directorial project was *The Belle of Amherst* with the Pinole Community Players. Ms. Coury is thrilled to not only be working with this very talented team of actors, but excited that this staged reading is being presented in multiple venues including Steeltown Coffee & Tea (Pittsburg) and The Campbell Theatre (Martinez). Claudia Rankine's *The White Card*, is relevant, poignant, and thought-provoking. All performances are followed by an actor/audience talk back, which Ms. Coury

believes is pivotal to the subject matter of the play. When not directing, Ms. Coury donates her time to her local animal shelter (Humane Society of the North Bay). Most importantly, however, she wants to thank her handsome hubby and their two furry kids for their love and support.

Synopsis

The White Card stages a conversation that is both informed and derailed by the black/white American drama. The scenes in this one-act play, for all the characters' disagreements, stalemates, and seeming impasses, explore what happens if one is willing to stay in the room when it is painful to bear the pressure to listen and the obligation to respond.

Claudia Rankine's *The White Card* poses the essential question: Can American society progress if whiteness remains invisible?

Composed of two scenes, the play opens with a dinner party thrown by Virginia and Charles, an influential Manhattan couple, for the up-and coming artist Charlotte. Their conversation about art and representations of race spirals toward the devastation of Virginia and Charles' intentions. One year later, the second scene brings Charlotte and Charles into the artist's studio, and their confrontation raises both the stakes and the questions of what - and who - is actually on display. Rankine's The White Card is a moving and revelatory distillation of racial divisions as experienced in the white spaces of the living room, the art gallery, the theater, and the imagination itself.


DESTY OLSON — Virginia Compton Spencer
