

MEET THE DIRECTOR



It is a privilege to direct this icon of American theatre. The play was awarded the Pulitzer Prize for Drama in 1948 and was made into a feature film in 1951. The 1988 revival on which our production is based won a Tony Award for best revival of a play.

Tennessee Williams is one of the three titans of American theater, alongside Eugene O'Neill and Arthur Miller. Influenced by the realism of playwrights like Ibsen and Chekhov, they created a uniquely American style of drama. The characters and setting of the play are drawn from Williams' life. His father was

an alcoholic salesman and his mother the daughter of an Episcopal priest. His sister Rose had severe mental illness and was institutionalized all her life. Williams lived in New Orleans when he wrote the play.

The feature of this play I find most interesting is the contrasts among the characters and the misunderstanding that leads to violence. Stella is descended from wealthy French ancestors who have been in America for nearly three-hundred years. Stanley is a first-generation American whose parents were peasant immigrants from Poland. Blanche was a kind and loving young woman until the tragic death of her husband. She ended up in a life of decay with her dying mother and impending homelessness. In her desperation, she gave herself to various men in an attempt to recover her gentile youth. Yet, she pretends to be superior to Stanley, insults him and threatens to break up his family. Mitch is a gentle and trusting man who Blanche tries to manipulate into rescuing her from poverty and shame.

Williams wrote in a letter to the director Elia Kazan,

I will try to clarify my intentions in this play. I think its best quality is its authenticity or its fidelity to life. There are no "good" or "bad" people. Some are a little better or a little worse, but all are activated more by misunderstanding than malice. A blindness to what is going on in each other's hearts.... Nobody sees anybody truly, but all through the flaws of their own ego. That is the way we all see each other in life. Vanity, fear, desire, competition – all such distortions within our own egos – condition our vision of those in relation to us. Add to those distortions in our own egos, the corresponding distortions in the egos of the others – and you see how cloudy the glass must become through which we look at each other.

There are two great lessons we should take from this play: First, a reminder that we are all flawed people trying to somehow live peacefully with other flawed people whom we don't really understand. Second, that we all need to look to own redemption and then try to better understand our neighbor.

My prayer, as always, is that this play will in some way help us all to be the people that we are made to be. To God be the glory.

DRAMATURG NOTE

Playwright Tennessee Williams called A Streetcar Named Desire the "ideal metaphor for the human condition."

A Streetcar Named Desire opened on Broadway in 1947, shocking its audience with the bold portrayal of sexuality, brutality, morality, desire and mental demise. When the play ended, the audience sat in silence, then, after a moment,



broke into a 30-minute applause. The taboo themes dealing with class tensions, homosexuality, gender power structure and migrant prejudice were explored through the clash between three main characters: Blanche DuBois, Stella DuBois and Stanley Kowalski.

The setting is a run-down, low-income, multi-ethnic area in the French Quarter of New Orleans, Louisiana, thriving in a mix of cultures, during a period of extreme change in America after World War II.

Williams introduced new theatrical ideas to the American theatre. In *A Streetcar Named Desire*, a strongly symbolic play, he employed what he termed "selective realism," using the elements of stage production, such as the set, props, costume, lighting and sound to "generate a theatrical experience greater than mere realism"

Williams illuminated the action, the theme, the characters, as well as the language,

with very explicit production details that would more closely approach the poetic truth. Specific use of sound and music, for example, emphasizes moments in the play where Blanche DuBois' grip on reality is fragile.

When a reoccurring tragic moment is recalled, Blanche hears the "Varsouviana Polka" playing in her head, which draws the audience into her tortured mind. Blanche's costumes evoke an image of her youth and her notion of a genteel Southerner. By way of the open set design, with no boundaries, the audience sees the parallel between the tense state of affairs inside the Kowalskis' apartment and the hostile, dangerous unsafe world outside. There is no safe harbor for Blanche. The set enhances the anguished relationship Blanche is experiencing between what is in her mind versus that which is occurring in real life.

A Streetcar Named Desire has inspired much analysis because It

expresses universal themes. It is a brilliant example of "selective realism" offering a vivid understanding of an earlier period in our uniquely American history. Written 78 years ago, its themes are very relevant today.
