MEET THE DIRECTOR



Dramaturg Note

Mary Chase's Gentle Giant

Mary Chase ended her employment at a newspaper in her native Denver in the early 1930s to raise three sons, and to work as a freelance writer. She had middling success with some early plays, one making it to Broadway for a relatively short run. In the 1940s, Chase, like most Americans, was navigating the fears, uncertainties, and heartbreaks of World War II. She recalled seeing a neighbor who lost her only son in battle, and wondered if she could "ever possibly write anything that might make this woman smile again?"

Her answer was *Harvey*, a sweet comedy about a charming, gentle soul named Elwood P. Dowd, whose best friend happens to be a six foot plus rabbit who, somewhat inconveniently, is invisible to most everyone except Elwood. The play was a major Broadway hit, winning the coveted Pulitzer for 1945, beating out what would eventually be considered a far more important work, a little something called *The Glass Menagerie*.

Elwood's escape into fantasy by way of a (possibly) imaginary friend seemed like a great idea to wartime audiences longing for a bit of magic and mystery. The show ran for four and a half years and was eventually sold to Hollywood for a cool million, a record at the time for a stage to cinema acquisition. The subsequent 1950 film version was led by James Stewart as Dowd, a role the actor considered one of his favorites.

Chase's Irish roots acquainted her with folklore related to pookahs (subject to a dizzying number of variant spellings).

Shape-shifting creatures who can appear in many animal forms including rabbits, pookahs are alternatively described as both help or hindrance to human beings. One specific aid they are said to give is to offer humans a ride if they drink too much, a handy service for Elwood, as it turns out.



But why a giant rabbit? Why not a giant... well, anything else?

While I couldn't locate any specific statement from Chase about why Harvey needed to be a rabbit, he is certainly not alone in the history of literature, religion, and art, where rabbits and hares have a long history of representation. Their cultural significance is unde-



niable, but what exactly they are meant to signify has nearly as many interpretations as there are appearances.

Rabbits have symbolized fertility and sexuality, innocence and purity, violence and vulnerability. Rabbits have figured prominently in the cultural and religious life of Ancient Egyptians and Native Americans, appearing in the Chinese zodiac, and across religions as various as Medieval Christianity, Buddhism, Islam, and Judaism.

Rabbits also abound in popular culture, from Beatrix Potter to Bugs Bunny. The Easter Bunny no doubt stemmed from early associations with fertility and Springtime, and, somewhat more recently, the rabbit God Tu'er Shen has come to represent LGBTQ people in China and Taiwan. Alice in Wonderland's White Rabbit and the March Hare, Uncle Remus' Br'er Rabbit, Rabbit in Winnie the Pooh, Thumper in Bambi, The Velveteen Rabbit, and the denizens of Watership Down, a runaway best-seller from the 1970s by Richard Adams, round out some of literature's best-known bunnies. Roger Rabbit, the Trix spokes-rabbit, the Energizer Bunny, and the vampiric Bunnicula are all beloved versions of pop culture rabbits, but who can forget Monty Python's fearsome Rabbit of Caerbannog? The joke in Holy Grail is that a rabbit couldn't possibly be something to fear, a belief which is then spectacularly and gruesomely disproven.

Fortunately for us, Harvey is no such rabbit. The play examines a very old question: What, exactly, is sane and what is insane, and which of us is one or the other? The play celebrates our human capacity for loyalty, our imagination, and our willingness to accept others without judging them. For anyone whose pets have also been among their best friends, this may come as no surprise: sometimes it takes an animal to remind us what it means to be human.




